



Overview of FoodShare Outreach Program

What is FoodShare?



FoodShare is an income-based, safety net program funded through the Federal Government to **supplement monthly income for groceries**. It is available to all persons who qualify. It is also known as SNAP (changed from food stamps in 2008), EBT, and the Quest Card.

The QUEST card is a **debit-like card** that is loaded with your FoodShare benefits on the same day each month. It **can be used at most grocery stores** and some Farmers' Markets to purchase groceries. It can even be used for qualified Community Support Agriculture (CSA) shares and Meals on Wheels!

What can I buy with my QUEST card?

You can use your QUEST card to buy grocery items like:

- Fruits and vegetables
- Breads and cereals
- Meats, fish, and poultry
- Dairy and eggs
- Seeds and plants to grow food for your family to eat

The QUEST card <u>CANNOT</u> be used for any of the following:

- Non-food items, like paper goods, toothpaste, soap, or pet food
- Alcohol or tobacco products
- Vitamins or medicine
- Food that you will eat in the store
- Pre-prepared foods (e.g. hot deli food)



Different Ways to Buy

At stores / retailers approved to accept QUEST

- Grocery stores
- Gas Stations
- Farmers Markets
- And more!

Right now there are also approved vendors that people can purchase food from online (only applicable foods can be covered by QUEST and any delivery fee would need to be paid separately)

On the helpline you will...

- 1. Complete a quick telephone interview to determine eligibility
- 2. If you are determined to be eligible, you will be referred to a FoodShare Specialist who will call the county with you for your FoodShare application and interview.

Through Access you will...

- 1. Be able to screen for eligibility
- 2. Set a filing date if applicable
- 3. Submit an application for FoodShare or FoodShare and Healthcare
- 4. Submit any documents requested for verification



^{*} See if your family's gross monthly income is at or below 200% of the federal poverty level (FPL). If it is, your family passes the Gross Income Test. You'll earn certain credits to be subtracted from your gross income. Learn more about credits and how we calculate your benefits in the ForwardHealth Enrollment and Benefits Handbook, P-00079.

More on eligibility...



In order to enroll in FoodShare, you must:

- Submit a FoodShare application;
- Complete a quick telephone interview with a case worker;
- Meet basic eligibility rules and income limits.

If you meet the following guidelines, you <u>may</u> be eligible for FoodShare:

- You are a US citizen or legal permanent resident of at least 5 years;
- You are a Wisconsin resident;
- You meet gross monthly income guidelines (on previous slide).



How do I apply?

At the FoodShare Helpline, we want to make applying for FoodShare as simple and stress-free as possible. We offer **free** help with the FoodShare application, either in person or over the phone. You can call the **FoodShare Helpline at 1-877-366-3635**.

How it works:

- Friendly FoodShare Helpline staff will ask you a few confidential questions to see if you might be eligible for FoodShare.
- The Helpline staff will set up an appointment for you to get help filling out the application.
- An Outreach Specialist will help you fill out and submit the application either in person or over the phone.



Eligibility Screening

- Done using the state's <u>www.access.wi.gov</u> site
- Quick, Easy and Confidential
 - No need to include client's name
 - Takes 5 minutes
- Does not determine eligibility but can provide an indication whether the client falls within the income limits


Manage your benefits >

Select the "See if you can get help" button to screen for all state benefit programs, including FoodShare and BadgerCare. FoodShare and BadgerCare are the only two programs you can apply for at the same time.

Other common questions we are asked...

How do I check the balance of my card? / I lost my card, how do I get a new one?

Can I also apply for health care?

 Yes! You can apply for Medicaid at the same time as applying for FoodShare benefits.

How can I renew my benefits?

 A FoodShare Specialist can assist you in renewing your benefits either in person or over the phone. Call our helpline at 877-366-3635 to get an appointment with a Specialist.

How can I find local food pantries?

How can I check the status of my programs and benefits?

Log in to your account online at https://access.wisconsin.gov/access/ or download the mobile app, MyAccessWisconsin, and use your Case Number to create an account.



Pandemic-EBT

There are 3 types of P-EBT

<u>School P-EBT:</u> Eligible school children who would have received free or reduced-price meals under the National School Lunch Act if their schools were not closed or operating with reduced hours or attendance for at least 5 consecutive days are eligible to receive P-EBT benefits.

<u>Pre-6 P-EBT:</u> Also provides benefits to younger children (0-5 years) in households participating in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) whose covered child care facility is closed or operating with reduced hours or attendance, or who live in the area of schools that are closed or operating with reduced hours or attendance.

<u>Summer P-EBT:</u> Wisconsin's Summer P-EBT program provides benefits to families of eligible school-age children and eligible non-school-age children to help cover the cost of meals between school years. **Updates for 2022-2023 Summer pending.**



Emergency Allotments

 In 2020, during the beginning of the pandemic, the federal government provided the opportunity for states to receive "Emergency Allotments" of FoodShare benefits. This meant each household received the maximum benefit available to them. Later, another bill was passed that allowed those already receiving the maximum to receive an additional \$95 per month.



EA Changes

- In December of 2022, the federal government passed a bill that ended the extra FoodShare benefits, called Emergency Allotments.
- The existence of these emergency benefits was always tied to the state of the pandemic across the country and in Wisconsin. The State of Wisconsin took advantage of this option, as well as others that streamlined program application and reduced red-tape, making it easier for households to access these benefits.



EA Impact & Importance

- Wisconsin as a state is losing over \$84 million dollars per month in FoodShare allotments
- Milwaukee County alone is losing almost \$29 million dollars per month in FoodShare allotments
- Average loss in benefits for each family is \$225
- Seniors that live on social security could see their benefits drop from \$281 to \$23 a month.



State-wide Impact of FoodShare Cuts

\$84 million of grocery benefits, each month, will disappear at the end of February, 2023.

All 700,000+ FoodShare participants in Wisconsin will be impacted, with the average household losing \$225 per month.

Ending of Emergency Allotments (EA)

The extra FoodShare payment, officially called Emergency Allotments, will end in February 2023.

Starting in March, people will only get their regular FoodShare payment loaded to their QUEST (EBT) card in the first half of the month. There will be no second payment later in the month.


What should people do?

Without the extra FoodShare, the benefit amount is based on the household income and the expenses the program allows people to report. Program participants should report up-to-date information as soon as possible so that they are receiving all of the benefits they are eligible for.



EA Cont'd - Information to Update

- Their Address.
- Income and the income of others in the FoodShare household.
 - Did anyone lose work hours or have their pay cut? If people are earning less, they may qualify for more FoodShare benefits.
- Expenses and other allowable deductions.
 - Paying more for child care?
 - If a person in the household is a senior or have a disability, do they pay more than \$35 in medical expenses per month?
 Providing proof of these expenses may help them qualify for more FoodShare.





EA Cont'd - Information to Update

Program participants can keep FoodShare benefits on their QUEST (EBT) card up to 12 months. If they find that the extra FoodShare EA is giving them a little more money for food than they need to spend, people can save them to spend in a later month.

This can be especially important for folks who are only receiving the minimum allotment.
